ANGEL

Angel is one of six of our Adelaide Dolphin Sanctuary Dolphins that have mastered the skill of tail walking.





BIANCA

Bianca is an adult female. She is another one of our dolphins that has learnt to tailwalk. She has had four calves.



BRONNY

Wave's oldest calf, Bronny is regularly seen swimming close to the rocks looking for fish. He has a large home range and can be seen throughout the river.





BUBBLES

Is one of Tiffany's calves. He is an active young male and is regularly seen with one of his good mates Lunar.

CRYSTAL

Crystal was named not long after he was born and like many of our dolphins we did not know if he was male or female until a few years later. He is regularly spotted around Garden Island.





DOC

Doc was born in December 2012. He is regularly seen in the inner port and near Garden Island with his mum, Bianca.



GEM

Both Gem and her Mum, Sparkle can regularly be seen out near Pelican Point and Outer Harbour. Gem was the only resident dolphin calf born at the beginning of 2012 to survive.





HOPE

Hope is one of our cheeky young male dolphins. He is often seen playing with his mates Crystal and Tallula.

LARTELARE

Lartelare is an Adult female. She is often seen in the Port River but has also been near Glenelg.





LUNAR


Lunar is a very active dolphin and can often be seen leaping into the air.

New Moon and Ryan used to be part of a gang of five Adult male dolphins. Sadly the other three members of the gang of five are no longer with us.





OLLIE

An Adult male. We regularly see Ollie swimming close to the shore. He is often seen swimming and fishing with the Pelicans.



ORIANA

Oriana is an adult female. She was the victim of a callous act by humans and was speared when she was young. Luckily she survived this incident.






RIPPLE

RYAN

Ryan is one of our oldest Male dolphins. Ryan and his good mate New Moon are often seen together.



SOPHIE

Sophie is an adult female. She is often seen with her calf near Pelican Point and Outer Harbour.





SPARKLE

Sparkle is one of our older females. Sparkle is a great mum and has a large family.

STAR

Star is a friendly female dolphin. She is regularly seen in the inner port and often rides the bow wave of the Dolphin Explorer.





SUMMER

Summer is a young female dolphin. She was born at the beginning of 2013 and can be seen throughout the river.



TALLULA

Tallula is a young male dolphin. Both Tallula and his mum survived horrific skin burns in 2010.





TIFFANY

Tiffany, an adult female has had three calves. She has a large home range and can be seen throughout the Port River.

TWINKLE

Twinkle is recognised by the distinct notches in his tail fluke. He has been entangled in fishing line four times.





UNHAP

Unhap is an adult male. He has a unique fishing technique using the tide, the current and a submerged fence to catch Bream.



WAVE

Wave is one of our most energetic dolphins and can be regularly seen tailwalking, a behaviour she learnt from her good friend Billie.





ZOOM

Zoom is another one of our dolphins that has a large home range and can be seen throughout the Port River. In December 2013 Zoom was observed with a skin burn on his right side.
